Keynote Address A most wicked problem: A conversation about climate change and moral responsibility

Planners talk about "wicked problems" that defy simple solutions. Climate change may be the most wicked problem fo all. It poses an existential threat to human civilization, yet political change to reduce the greenhouse gas emissions remains difficult to achieve. How can we live up to our moral responsibility—as individuals and as citizens working together—to address this issue?



David Beach, director of GreenCityBlueLake Institute the Cleveland Museum at Natural History, has been a visionary for sustainability and the environment in Northeast Ohio for more than 25 years. He has been responsible for initiating numerous organizations and projects, including EcoCity Cleveland, the Citizen's Bioregional Plan, Greater Ohio Policy Center, the City of Cleveland's office of Sustainability, and the Cleveland Ecovillage. His writing, editing, and public speaking have helped to shape major civic issues such as regional land use, watershed planning, transportation priorities, and the need to reduce carbon emissions

Presenters

Maria Alberto is an M.A. candidate in the Literature program at Cleveland State University. Her research interests concern the intersections of canonicity and culture, and she has written about transmedia and popular culture. She is currently working on a book chapter and on her thesis.

Amy Baird is a graduate student at the University of Akron getting her Masters in English Composition with the TESOL endorsement. Her interests include ESL, French, linguistics, and cooking.

Rauslynn Boyd is a Master's Degree Candidate (August 2015), in The School of Communication at The University of Akron. Specifically, she majors in Communication Studies with a focus in Cultural Criticism. Her writing interests include Race, Gender and Class Inequality, Black Feminism, Identity Construction of African American Females, and Scholarship of Teaching and Learning. She is also a graduate teaching assistant, has taught Introduction to Public Speaking, Effective Oral Communication, and lectured on communication topics such as, Mass Communication, Intercultural Communication and Persuasion. She holds a B.A. in Business and Organizational Communication, 2013.

Daniel J. Cleary is an Associate Professor of English and Writing Program Director at Lorain County Community College, where he received the 2013 Faculty Excellence Award. He holds a BA and MA in English from the University of Dayton and a PhD in English (Rhetoric and Composition) from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Dan also is Executive Director and President of the Northeast Ohio Community Outreach Project, a nonprofit organization that brings literacy instruction to inmates in Ohio's prisons. He is currently serving a term on the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) Standing Committee on International Concerns and is the founder of the Council of Writing Program Administrators (CWPA) Two-Year Caucus. Dan reviews manuscripts for WPA: Writing Program Administration and presentations for the CWPA conference. His writings have appeared in or are forthcoming in venues such as Literacy in Composition Studies, The North Coast Review, Journal of Writing Studies, Jenny, and Teaching English in the Two-Year College. He is also the author of five children's books, four fiction titles and one nonfiction title, to be released by Kaeden Books in 2015. Dan is completing his MFA thesis at Cleveland State University through the NEOMFA.

Maya Cope-Crisford is an Ohio native. She attended the University of North Texas for her undergraduate degree in English, where she graduated Magna Cum Laude. She is a now a Graduate Assistant in the English department at the University of Akron, working on her Master's in Literature. After completing her Masters, Maya plans on pursuing a PhD in 18th-20th Century British Literature, with a focus on Romantic and Gothic Lit as well as an exploration of the ways in which scientific innovation affected the literature of the time.
